We are all gathered here for the sole purpose of praying for moral renewal, moral regeneration, peace, stability, unity and reconciliation in the North West – as a responsible government and a responsible people.

Of lately, we have witnessed various incidents of violence and the deterioration of morality in society and our province has not been an exception to some of these foul deeds; and therefore, it is only fair that we embark on these series of district prayer to actually work towards cleansing communities and society of the lack of morality and humanity.
