DEPUTY MINISTER TAU TRACKS PROGRESS IN DITSOBOTLA

eputy Minister of Cooperative Governance, Parks Tau recently visited the Ditsobotla Local Municipality to assess the situation at the municipality, which has had numerous challenges since the inauguration of the new council following last year's by-elections in the area.

Deputy Minister Tau was accompanied by the MEC for Cooperative Governance, Human Settlements and Traditional, Patrick Nono Dumile Maloyi, and the MEC for Finance, Motlalepula Rosho, Mayor of the Ditsobotla Local Municipality, Thabo Nkashe, councillors, and officials from the three spheres of government. Some of the challenges facing the municipality include electricity supply challenges because of aging infrastructure faults, vandalism of transformers, and the impact of loadshedding on infrastructure.

"To arrest these challenges, the municipality should explore the prioritization of building internal electricity capacity including human, material, equipment, and financial capacity", Deputy Minister Tau said.

Other topics discussed included the state of the municipality, financial recovery plans, electricity supply, provision of water, and management



of the bulk accounts. The engagement presented the municipality with urgent deliverables about the need to employ competent staff to manage and operate services such as water, sanitation, roads, and electricity.

Regarding the water supply challenge to communities in Ditsobotla, Deputy Minister Tau said that the Ngaka Modiri District Municipality, as a Water Service Authority (WSA) should implement the interventions that include a turnaround plan developed by the Municipal Infrastructure Support Agent (MISA) speedily and this plan outlines amongst other things, soft management interventions and hard infrastructure programs which include refurbishing and drilling of boreholes. "These interventions will alleviate the plight of the businesses and residents of Ditsobotla", Deputy Minister Tau said. The Financial Recovery Plan (FRP) is being implemented in the municipality in three phases, namely rescue, stabilization, and sustainability phases, however, the existence of vacancies in senior management positions is hindering the effective implementation of the FRP.Notable progress has also been registered in key governance undertakings and structures which includes the establishment of a Section 79 Committee to oversee the implementation of the FRP. The Municipal Public Accounts Committee (MPAC) is also functional. The Credit Control policy and by-laws were adopted by the Council for implementation and enforcement pending gazetting. Additionally, a switching stations assessment was conducted which recommended the upgrade of the electricity line that supplies the bulk water borehole to reduce power failure that affects the pumping of water. The council of Ditsobotla was dissolved in September 2023 in terms of Section 139(1)(c) of the Constitution of the Republic of South Africa. The decision came because of the failure of the municipality to render basic services due to challenges in both the administration and council. A new council of Ditsobotla was constituted on 09 January 2023 during a special council meeting which was held at the Ngaka Modiri Molema District Municipality council chambers in Mahikeng. The municipality is currently under section 139(5) (a) and (c) of the Constitution, which gives the provincial government a mandatory intervention in the municipality. The imposition of mandatory intervention was because of stubborn challenges including those related to the finances of the municipality.

Both the Department of Cooperative Governance and Traditional Affairs and the Provincial Treasury have deployed a team of officials to assist the municipality.

ENGAGEMENT SESSIONS TO IMPROVE MUNICIPALITY EFFECTIVENESS

strengthen municipal support and improve effectiveness in terms of Section 154 of the Constitution, the Department of Cooperative Governance and Traditional Affairs (COGTA) recently convened one-onone engagement sessions with all municipalities in the North West to provide support and strengthen their capacity of municipalities to manage their affairs.

The engagement sessions which were graced by the attendance of Municipal Managers, the Municipal Infrastructure Support Agent (MISA), the South African Local Government Association (SALGA), the Provincial Treasury as well as the Department of Water and Sanitation (DWS), were held under the theme "Strengthening municipal support program to improve its effectiveness".

Addressing municipalities during the sessions, COGTA Head of Department Dr Ben Bole said that the engagement sessions are aimed at having a frank discussion to find solutions to challenges facing municipalities.

"We have crafted specific objectives to restore order and stability in municipalities. Information must not be held back so that we can assist and support municipalities to uphold their constitutional mandate of providing services to communities without fail", Dr Bole said.

He further indicated that they decided on the one-on-one engagements because the methodology that was used in the previous years has not yielded any

positive results and things could not continue like it is business as usual.

"We have the responsibility to support local municipalities because a crisis in any municipality is a crisis of the department. We can only craft intervention measures that are effective for different municipalities as long as we know the challenges that we are facing in our municipalities", Dr Bole said.

All municipalities provided progress reports on issues related to service delivery and infrastructure grant spending.

They also outlined the challenges that they are facing which hinder the provision of services, including vacant senior management posts and the lack of resources.

The objective was to verify and validate the situation in municipalities, and to assess, review, and develop new improvement plans on the state of each municipality for improved collaboration and accountability.

After deliberations on the state of municipalities in Dr. Kenneth Kaunda and Ngaka Modiri Molema districts, Dr. Bole appreciated the advice and directives provided to municipalities by different stakeholders to rectify their challenges.

He maintained that constant engagement sessions will assist the department in tracking the performance of municipalities to provide the necessary support.

"We will continue to hold these sessions to support municipalities because a collapse of one municipality is the collapse of the national government and its entities. Therefore, we must support and strengthen the capacity of municipalities for them to perform their functions', Dr Bole said.

NW ROAD P175/1 WILL SPARK OFF **MUCH-NEEDED ECONOMIC ACTIVITY**

he more than 22km rehabilitation road project between Potchefstroom and Vanderbjilpark, which will serve as an economic corridor between the North West, Gauteng, and Free State provinces and is meant to be used for transportation of agricultural produce and tourism, has been completed.

The project, which cost the Department of Public Works and Roads (DPWR) a total of R144 million was completed on schedule and within the allocated budget with very few disruptions for the duration of the project.

Road infrastructure network is the heartbeat of economic growth and social development for any developing nation.



Addressing the farming community of Rietfontein, MEC for Public Works and Roads, Gaoage Oageng Molapisi said this road will play a significant role as it is used by

the farmers to transport fresh produce to Gauteng, which is the economic hub of our country, as well as other markets.

"We are glad that this project reached completion and that our

people will commute safely with neighbouring provinces both for business and leisure", MEC Molapisi said.

"A road network is critical to a country's economic development, it connects cities and ensures the smooth travel of commuters, private vehicles, and logistics solutions", he

With the North West being a predominantly rural province, with a total road network of 19 673 km across all the four districts, only 5 470 km of that is surfaced.

The province needs at least R 34 billion to ensure that all its roads are

Addressing the 27th World Road Congress in the Czech Republic, which was held in October this year, Minister of Transport Sindisiwe Chikunga said establishing an expansive and effective road network is critical to South Africa's economic growth.

UNICEF DONATES COLD ROOM TO BRITS HOSPITAL PHARMACY

he United National International Children's Emergency Fund (UNICEF) has recently donated a cold room to the Brits Hospital's Pharmaceutical Unit as the old cold room could no longer keep the minimum required temperature range.

According to cold chain management regulations, all pharmaceutical stock should be stored within a temperature range of 2 to 8 degrees Celsius.

District Pharmacist, Linda Oelofse, said that they had asked for the donation after noticing how the hospital's pharmacy was struggling, and understanding the importance of cold chain management that was not being applied due to the malfunctioning of the old cold room.

Oelofse said that the old cold room would, at times, go below 2 degrees Celsius and the pharmaceutical stock would freeze.

This means that the pharmacist would then have to call the pharmaceutical companies to determine if the pharmaceuticals are safe to use.

"The cold room didn't have an alarm system to alert the pharmacist if the cold room is out of the temperature range, if the cold room went out of the temperature range during the weekend, the pharmacists would only discover on Monday morning", Oelofse said.

This problem caused the Brits District Hospital pharmacy to store their stock at the Madibeng Sub-District pharmacy since they did not have enough fridges to keep all the stock.



The pharmacist would then have to drive weekly to Madibeng Sub-District to collect the stock and this affected the availability of stock at the hospital since they could not order normal quantities to keep all stock due to lack of space.

Oelofse said that having a cold room has improved the cold chain availability and it has made it easier for the pharmacy to manage their stock better.

STAKEHOLDERS AMEND THE DHET POLICIES

n ensuring that skills development providers thrive in training graduates, the Department of Higher Education and Training (DHET) through its statutory body, the National Skills Authority (NSA), and North West Provincial Government recently conducted a public consultation workshop in Brits to solicit ideas to amend skills development related policies.

This is to increase graduates' chances of finding employment and improve their socio-economic conditions.

Employers that spend R500 000 or more on their payroll are required, by law, to pay skills development levies of 1% of their total payroll to the South African Revenue Service (SARS) convert it to 100%, and give it to DHET.

The Department allocates 20% of



this money to the National Skills Fund and 80% to Sector Education and Training Authorities (SETAs) as they provide financial support to sectors that provide training, on this 80% the Trainers only receive 10% to run their administration affairs while 49,5% is

allocated to Discretionary grant funding, 20% for mandatory funds and 0.5% to QTC.

Tshepo Ntwagae said that the 10% admin fee that SETAs allocate to them is not sufficient and pleaded with the department to at least

increase it by 5%.

"The 10% allocated to SETAs is not enough, I propose that it should be increased to 15%", Ntwagae said.

Thabang Modise pleaded with the Department to guide SETAs to provide a fair allocation of funds nationally.

"All nine provinces should receive equitable share so that we can all have functional administrations," he said.

Masixole Bangeni said that SETAs should allocate special funds for contemporary Technological equipment.

Deputy Director General for Administration in the Office of the Premier Relebohile Mofokane expressed his satisfaction with stakeholders' active participation during the session, saying that their ideas will resolve their challenges.

The DHET engagement team will consolidate these ideas and suggestions so that the department can find ways on how best to implement them.







RESTORATION PRAYER FOR A COMMUNITY IN DISTRESS

he North West Department of Community Safety and Transport Management recently held a Restoration Prayer Service at the Popo Molefe informal settlement outside Rustenburg, where nine people lost their lives and another eleven were left seriously wounded following an earlier deadly shooting incident in the area.

Amongst those who survived is a ten-year-old boy who escaped unharmed but is undergoing psychological treatment because of the mental scars he has sustained from witnessing the gruesome shootings.

Another survivor is 52-year-old mine worker, Balekile Nomahelle, who is part of the eleven survivors and wears a sling to support his injured left arm, which is a painful reminder of the events of that fateful

Even though he says he is recovering well, he fears the injury might have adverse consequences

eventually and affect his ability to provide for his family.

The trauma, because of the attack, has also affected him physiologically. Normally a jovial person, sadness clouds his face as he recounts the events of the day.

"A group of people were gathered here in my yard, nothing unusual because it was during the long weekend. Suddenly, two armed people entered the yard. I quickly realized that there was more outside. I made a run for it as they opened fire randomly in a short space of time", He shook his head still wondering how he survived.

"I can still recall the thick pungent smell of the gunpowder in the air, the screams from fear and confusion, the lifeless bodies in puddles of blood right on my doorstep. It was horrific, it was frightening, and I am still trying to come to terms with the trauma", Nomahelle said.

The ruthless killings sent a wave of shock to the community, leaving them feeling unsafe and in fear for their lives.

It is alleged that the shooting was a retaliation by the Sesotho-speaking group of the community against the IsiXhosa-speaking group who had lived peacefully with each other for a long time.

The source of conflict allegedly stems from among others stock theft and a subsequent torching of

The MEC for Community Safety and Transport Management, Sello Lehari led the prayer and cleansing ceremony at the scene of the shooting.

This formed part of the ongoing social intervention programmes in the area.

This is a partnership between the government, private sector, community leaders, and religious groups to restore trust and social cohesion as well as healing to the community.

"As South Africans our diversity in culture, language, tradition as well as other variations should unite us as one people. We ought to embrace those differences and not use them as tools of destruction, disunity, and a source of conflict", MEC Lehari told the more than 500 community members in attendance.

"The tears shed by our people will not dry on their own. We speak life back into this community. We ask God to deal with the pain that has dimmed the light of this community. The Holy Book tells us, that in agony, God's peace shall be left with us and so may it be", Chaplain Jerry Batshelakang said.

The Department of Community Safety and Transport Management with other stakeholders continues to work towards reconciling the two groups.

NORTH WEST CONSUMER AFFAIRS ALERTS LEARNERS AGAINST FRAUDULENT INSTITUTIONS OF HIGHER LEARNING

he North West Department of Economic Development, Environment, Conservation and Tourism (DEDECT) has issued an advisory through its Consumer Affairs Office to alert parents and students about the growing threat posed by unregistered higher education institutions.

The Consumer Affairs Office acknowledges the increasing risk faced by prospective students who may be misled by deceptive institutions, leading them to obtain qualifications that hold no recognition or value.

These bogus institutions prey on the aspirations of students seeking higher education, manipulating their desire for academic credentials.

One concerning tactic involves adopting names and logos that closely resemble those of legitimate universities, making it difficult for students to differentiate between credible and fraudulent entities.

Expressing deep concern, the Consumer Affairs Office warns that unsuspecting students may inadvertently pay tuition fees to colleges lacking accreditation, rendering any qualifications obtained from such institutions worthless.

To address this issue, the Consumer Affairs Office strongly encourages parents and students to take initiative-taking measures.

The Consumer Affairs Office advise verifying the credibility of institutions by cross-checking with relevant departments, especially the Department of Higher Education (DHE), and ensuring course

accreditation with the South African Qualifications Authority (SAQA) before registration and fee payment.

For easy verification, the Consumer Affairs Office recommends contacting the Department of Higher Education at 012 312 5911 or their toll-free number 0800 87 2222, visiting their website at www.dhet.org.za, reaching out to UMALUSI at 0860 35 66 35 or visiting www.umalusi.org.za, and checking (SAQA) at www.saqa.org.za.

The rise in fraudulent tertiary institutions poses a critical issue requiring swift intervention to preserve students' educational ambitions and the integrity of higher education.

The DEDECT emphasizes the long-term consequences of this trend on students' academic and career lives.

"It is important for consumers to be

aware of their rights and responsibilities. Thoroughly research the institution before enrolling to avoid falling prey to illegal or non-registered institutions. According to the Consumer Protection Act No. 68 of 2008, consumers have rights, including 'The right to choose' and 'The right to disclosure and information", a departmental official said.

The DEDECT urges those who have fallen victim to illegal operators to contact the Consumer Affairs Office at 018 388 5844/845 or visit the office located at the NWDC Building, Corner University and Provident Drive, Mmabatho.

Consumers can also seek assistance from the departmental district offices located in Rustenburg, Klerksdorp, Brits, and Vryburg.
