Bulls play a major role in determining the future performance of the herd, and that is why we encourage our farmers to take good care of these bulls, so they can, in turn, take care of them", MEC Sambatha said. He explained how the Bulls Sire program will strengthen the red meat commodity in the North West, as well as offer farmers improved livestock genetics, and reduce the need for supplementary feeding and veterinary care while boosting milk



production, growth rates, and overall livestock productivity.

One of the beneficiaries is Agnes Thibelang, a farmer from Ganyesa in the Dr Ruth Segomotsi Mompati District Municipality, who was grateful for the donation.

"The Nguni breed is well-suited to my dry region due to its adaptability and low maintenance. These bulls are of exceptional quality and will enhance the overall value of my herd," she said.

The Nguni bulls, beyond their agricultural benefits, serve as symbols of cultural heritage in African communities.

"I would like to thank the Department of Human Settlements for building a house for me and my children, this feels like a dream, and I am grateful", Matsane said.

MEC Molapisi added that counselling will be arranged for Matsane to change her life and that of her children for the better.

Another recipient was 37-year-old Margaret Tau, who received the house on behalf of her late grandmother, Martha Tau.

She said her family comes from Bornou Farms next to Delareyville and later moved to Middleton B.

Tau is unemployed and survives on a child support grant she receives for her three children.

She said that even though her grandmother is no longer with them, she is resting in peace knowing that she has left a legacy for her family as they now have a roof over their heads. MEC Molapisi said that government will continue providing people with houses but urged beneficiaries to take good care of the houses.





"It is the responsibility of

government to ensure that the women are prioritized, and their dignity is restored as it is stipulated in the Bill of Rights that all human beings must have shelter and live in decent houses", MEC Molapisi said. Mkhari said it has always been her dream to own one and that has become a reality.

She said she had learned to play the piano at the age of six using her father's old model piano.

HSRC WORKING TO REDUCE HIV INFECTIONS IN THE NORTH WEST

S peaking at a recent Provincial Dissemination Dialogue of the Sixth South African National HIV Prevalence, Incidence, and Behaviour Survey (SABSSM VI) in Mahikeng, the Human Sciences Research Council's Prof Khangelani Zuma said they have put measures in place to ensure that HIV infections decrease in the North West Province. Prof Zuma said that the HSRC is making HIV prevention and treatment facilities more accessible for the communities.

"We are taking proactive steps to reduce the prevalence of HIV in our region, we are expanding access to HIV testing and treatment services, making them available at more healthcare facilities and community about HIV prevention, transmission, and treatment", Prof Zuma added.

By promoting awareness and understanding, the government hopes to reduce stigma and encourage responsible behavior.

He further said that they are providing support to vulnerable populations, including orphans and vulnerable children, sex workers, and men who have sex with men. He added that the HSRC is partnering with civic organizations to intensify their efforts to reach communities in large quantities. our efforts and leverage resources effectively, by working together, the government and community partners can reach more people and make a greater impact", Prof Zuma said.

He said that they are using data to inform their HIV response, track progress registered, and adjust their

centers", Prof Zuma said.

He further said that the council has already launched public awareness campaigns to teach communities how HIV is transmitted, how to prevent it and treat it if they are already infected by the disease. "Public awareness campaigns are being launched to educate residents

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ENHANCING THE EGG BUSINESS TO ACHIEVE NEW LEVELS OF SUCCESS

n a significant move towards Sibongile Gumede, a small-scale farmer from Lindequesdrift in the JB Marks Municipality ventured into poultry farming in 2018 after identifying a gap in the market and she currently houses 1500 points of Amberlinks chicken breed, which are designed to be "egg-laying machines".

The eggs produced on her farm undergo a regular egg grading process conducted by the South African Poultry Association (SAPA).

The interior of the eggs is graded using a method called candling, which involves the use of an egg candler to examine the air cell, the egg white, known as an albumen, and the volk.

Candling also enables the detection of spots and cracks on the eggshell.

To assess the egg quality, SAPA uses a random sampling method for grading, providing clear insight into the quality of eggs produced by a specific batch of chickens.

"After the grading process, SAPA provides a detailed report and recommendations on how to improve the egg quality if there are any issues. For an egg to be considered Grade A, the egg white should not be lumpy or stuck to the shell, and the yolk should be perfectly golden. The blood clots found inside eggs are normal, and eggs should not encounter water as this depletes their calcium", Gumede said. The goal is to achieve Grade A, which can only be attained through consistent and nutritious feed. In the initial cycle, chickens usually produce small eggs called "quail," and farmers should not be discouraged as it is normal. Regular health and growth checks are vital for chickens to produce the right quality and quantity. Additionally, recycling eggshells and mixing them with the feed provide a



good source of calcium for the chickens' bones.

Once the grading process is complete, the batch of eggs is given a

barcode for tracking during that cycle. This enables consumers and stores to contact the supplier in case of any complaints. Gumede has received support from the department through extension and advisory services, as well as funding for water reticulation and the construction of a borehole.

A contractor is currently on site to erect a 5000-point layer house, which will allow the farmer to expand her business and market.

"I am grateful for the assistance that I am receiving from the Department. Currently, I'm meeting the demand for eggs by partnering with other local farmers, but the new house will reduce the need to source from other businesses and will allow my profits to grow", she said.

She is currently supplying eggs to various supermarkets and outlets in the Dr Kenneth Kaunda District as well as operating an online storefront, Bongi G, where she offers customers a convenient avenue to place orders with doorstep delivery services.



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COGTA TACKLES GOVERNANCE ISSUES IN MUNICIPALITIES

EC for Cooperative Governance, Human Settlements and Traditional Affairs (COGHSTA), Gaoage Oageng Molapisi recently announced decisive measures to improve governance and financial management across all municipalities in the North West.

Delivering the 2024/2025 departmental budget speech in the North West Provincial Legislature, MEC Molapisi highlighted several key initiatives aimed at enhancing municipal administration, integrity, and financial health. To strengthen municipal governance, MEC Molapisi announced that the department issued a directive last year to all municipalities to fill all senior management and critical vacant posts.

"Out of the 22 municipalities in the province, only Madibeng and Lekwa-Teemane are yet to appoint Municipal Managers. This process is receiving the highest priority to ensure effective municipal administration", MEC Molapisi said.

In pursuit of a clean administration, a training program on the Municipal Integrity Management Framework (MIMF) will be rolled out for councilors, officials, and community members.

"The MIMF sets high standards of integrity and ethical behavior, guiding municipalities in conducting their services. This initiative aims to restore public confidence in local government, ensuring no one is left behind", MEC Molapisi said.

He indicated that municipalities have significantly contributed to Eskom's financial challenges, currently owing the power utility R5.4 billion.

"To tackle this issue, the department, in partnership with the Provincial Treasury, has facilitated a programme on Debt Relief for municipalities. This initiative has assisted municipalities in meeting their contractual obligations with Eskom. The municipalities involved in this program include Madibeng, Kgetlengrivier, Maquassi Hills, Ramotshere Moiloa, Ditsobotla, Naledi, Tswaing, Mamusa, Lekwa-Teemane and Matlosana", MEC Molapisi added.

He announced that the

department has implemented a robust monitoring and evaluation mechanism and introduced revenue enhancement policy interventions to help municipalities improve revenue collection and meet their credit obligations.

"These interventions will be closely monitored to ensure their effectiveness and sustainability. The department will continue to provide capacity support to municipalities, ensuring they prepare Annual Financial Statements per the Municipal Financial Management Act (MFMA). The department will also continue to empower committees such as the Municipal Public Accounts Committees (MPAC) through various interventions, to strengthen and enhance their effectiveness", he said.

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THREE MEMBER STATES TO SUPPORT ECONOMIC GROWTH ALONG THE CORRIDOR

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A clarion call has been made for the Trans Kalahari Corridor (TKC) three Member States to strengthen initiatives on supporting the economic growth of the three countries by supporting spatial development initiatives along the corridor.

The Executive Director for the TKC Secretariat, Leslie Mlungisi Mpofu said a lot has been achieved since the signing of the Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) in 2003, however, more strategic issues still need to be attended to.

He said that the 14th Joint Law Enforcement Operation (JLEO) is critical and strategic proof that the MoU objectives have been given attention and it is now important to advance measures so that communities along the corridor can benefit.

Mpofu said the corridor connects intra and inter-regional economic areas in a defined geographical sphere.

He further said there are perceived socio-economic development opportunities and benefits promoted by corridor development and these include, but are not limited to, diversification of the region's industrial base, regional approach in mobilizing for Foreign Direct Investment (FDI), corridors are direct ways to bring about regional integration, corridors promote regional integration, and this is key in promoting growth prospects to developing countries.

He added that corridors help to prioritize the development of infrastructure to plug out the missing links in developing regions.





the regional economic growth, increase the rate of economic growth, and create employment, both formal and informal", Mpofu said.

On behalf of the Republic of South Africa, co-chair Segodi Mogotsi said "We remain committed as a country to the vision of our forebears to connect and integrate the region. Trans Kalahari Corridor remains one of our torchbearers in the continent with its success seen in the growth of traffic volumes, and infrastructure investment along the corridor in the three member states". In her speech representing Botswana, Masego Gertz said the 14th JLEO presents a platform for reaffirmation and recommitment to the enhancement of trade and deepening socio-economic integration.

She said the three-member states have committed and pledged to eradicate poverty and place their countries on a path of sustainable growth.

"We have not done enough in the past 20 years as our communities are still not benefiting economically, particularly SMMEs", Gertz added. She called on the member states to ensure that communities along the TKC are the first to enjoy the benefits through business opportunities and employment. said the MoU is an important initiative as it is a step towards eliminating non-tariff barriers.

"Although tariff barriers erected at the borders and within countries have been reduced considerably in the course of successive trade negotiations following the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade (GATT) and the World Trade Organisation (WTO) rules; there is an increase in the relative importance of non-tariff measures both as an instrument of protection and a means of regulatory trade," he said.

Different key stakeholders from the three member states delivered presentations and country reports during the two-day informationsharing session in Rustenburg.

This year's JLEO is held under the theme "United in Deepening Regional Integration and Growing Economies."

The Trans Kalahari Corridor is a r o a d n e t w o r k s p a n n i n g approximately 1900 kilometers across the territories of Botswana, Namibia, and South Africa. The corridor is a conduit for economic growth and development for the entire region in fulfilling the objective of the SADC Protocol and African Union Vision 2063.

"Corridors provide an important connection between economic nodes or hubs; therefore, it is high time the three member states support



water collection.



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COGTA RESTORES CONSISTENT WATER SUPPLY IN SETABENG

he North West Department of Cooperative Governance and Traditional Affairs (COGTA) recently handed over a refurbished and redrilled borehole which will ensure consistent water supply to residents of Setabeng village near Tseoge, in the Kagisano Molopo Local Municipality, as part of the ongoing Thuntsha Lerole Accelerated Service Delivery Programme (ASDP).

During the yielding process, funded by the Provincial Treasury, it

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NGAKA MODIRI MOLEMA INTRODUCES CONTRACT FOR WATER PROJECT IN MAHIKENG


he Executive Mayor of Ngaka Modiri Molema District Municipality, Cllr Khumalo Molefe recently introduced a contractor for a R136.7 million water project aimed at improving access to clean water for communities of Wards 29 and 32 in the Mahikeng Local Municipality.

This project, which is scheduled to be completed in the next 24 months, will benefit an estimated 21 115 residents of Lonely Park, Leopard Park, parts of Signal Hill and Setumo Park, Units 3 and 6 as well as Molelwane and Sonderwater.

This initiative is part of the Operation Bulela Metsi, a districtwide effort to ensure consistent and adequate water supply to local communities.

Currently, some of the villages receive water from Mmabatho Water Treatment Plant and this project will extend and augment the demand of the growing population.

The project specifications include but not limited to the refurbishment of existing five boreholes, equipping



and electrification of four new and seven existing boreholes, laying 10 632m of a uPVC bulk pipeline from boreholes, installation of 10 044-yard connections and supply and installation of four elevated steel tanks with sizes ranging from 588 kilolitres to 1634 kilolitres.

The project is expected to employ 60 temporary workers, including Community Liaison Officers and benefit six SMMEs. "I personally urge and plea with the community to ensure that the project commences and runs smoothly until completion without any disruptions; and not to extort money from the contractor. It is our plea as government that this infrastructure must be protected from vandalism by yourselves and circumvent the delay of the project. The project will create around 63 job opportunities for men, women, unemploved.
